On February 29, 2020, the funeral service for Lee was held at the Rush Creek Bible Church in Byron Center, Michigan. Several hundred individuals, some traveling a few hundred miles, attended with a clear testimony to the impact Lee's ministry had had upon their lives. The service, which lasted approximately three hours, was filled with the music Lee loved and testimonies from family and friends. There was laughter, and there were tears as events in Lee's life and ministry were shared. There can be no doubt that Lee Homoki was larger than life in numerous ways and his life and ministry touched many.

We would ask that you lift up Darlene, Cari, and Steve in your prayers, as they continue with their daily lives. Pray

that the Lord's peace and grace will be all-sufficient, even as the Apostle Paul found it to be in his life. "And He said

unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me," 2 Cor. 12:9.

As you leaf through this edition of the *Truth Aflame*, you will read testimonials from numerous friends, pastors, and ministry leaders. I know your heart will be blessed as they paint a picture of the heart of S. Lee Homoki and his compassion for the souls of mankind.

While you are at it, enjoy the pictures of Lee's life and ministry. (Lee was a prolific photographer; you would not believe the number of pictures we have on file.) In more recent times, when Darlene was able to travel with Lee, she became the photographer and was rarely seen without her little camera in hand.

I first heard Lee when he spoke at my home church, the Altoona Bible Church in Altoona, Pennsylvania, sometime in the mid to late seventies. Our pastor, Pastor Henry Kulp had invited this "new" guy to the "Grace Message" to preach and had announced that his name was Lee Homoki. Well, I found that name very interesting in that I had never heard a Chinese preacher and looked forward to the Sunday when he would be speaking. That morning as Susan and I arrived at the church, I looked around to catch a glimpse of the speaker. Wow! Was I surprised, and a little disappointed, when this tall, thin, dark-haired gentleman in a black suit, wearing a tie, and carrying a large Bible held close to his chest walked out onto the platform. I'll never forget that first encounter. Pastor Kulp was an animated preacher and never stood still for very long, but this guy's arms were waving all over the place. He was loud and waved his Bible in the air, as he poured out his heart for the Word and the Gospel.

It would be a couple of years before our paths would cross again. Lee had suffered a stroke and, as he made his way back into preaching, he was invited to speak at the church where I was the Associate Pastor. He struggled that day. I remember thinking how painful it must be to search for his words as he did but, as he preached, the old Lee could be seen peeking through.


Philippines. It was through this relationship that my association with BDTLB would eventually change.

In 2002, I had begun sensing a need to make a change in ministry, a change that would take me out of the pastorate and into an itinerant evangelistic, Bible teaching ministry. In 2003, Lee invited my brother and me to Bushnell, Illinois, to help him with a crusade he would be conducting for a week. Since Lee had left the pastorate and had entered an itinerant ministry, I decided that, if possible, I would arrange for a private time to discuss my feelings. We met for coffee and, when I told him of my thoughts, a big smile came across his face, as he told me that the BDTLB Board had begun praying that the Lord would bring someone to BDTLB

that was familiar with the ministry, had a passion for the lost, and was willing to travel. We left our meeting deciding to begin praying, seeking the Lord's direction for the future. In 2004, I partnered with Lee and Darlene in their VBS ministry. After I preached in my church on Sunday, that evening I would head out to wherever the Homokis were set to minister.

Our whole family has so benefited from Lee Homoki who was full of fun and enthusiasm, an amazing individual, and a real warrior for the Lord. Cowboy Lee had a vision of reaching boys and girls through the avenue that meant so much to him— the cowboy lifestyle and the cowboy way. He was diligent in creating a program that fulfilled his passion for bringing youth to Christ. Cowboy Lee could draw out the God-given talents that one didn't even know they had. That is what he did when choosing me to direct the Cowboy Camp in Apollo, Pennsylvania. June and I were stretched to new limits and were blessed beyond measure in the process. What a mentor he was to his staff and the Apollo ranch crew. And the way he motivated the buckaroos was beautiful to behold. We still hear from former camp attendees who are now adults, many in mentoring roles themselves and active in their churches and other ministries. Cowboy Lee's vision lives on.

When Pastor Lee Homoki learned that Carl and Clayton Schutter were thinking of starting a gospel cowboy singing group, he fervently urged us to do so. He even suggested a name: Riding for the Brand. This was his motto in his Whips & Ropes program which he performed in countless venues over many years. Riding for the Brand has been doing about twenty performances a year, now entering our seventh year. By mixing secular cowboy ballads with gospel songs of a cowboy nature, we get invited to events where a gospel quartet would not ordinarily have an opportunity to minister. Lee loved this.

My oldest son was entering kindergarten the year we met Lee nearly forty years ago. He and Finley Hunter held evangelistic meetings in the beginning days of the church my parents founded, Berean Bible Church in Minerva, Ohio, which met at the Fairmount Grange at the time. In subsequent years, the Joint-Heirs would travel with him, bringing their harmony in music to life.

Lee held special services and "Cowboy Round-ups" at our churches in Beloit, Wisconsin, and Fairhope, Alabama. He performed his rope tricks, sharing the gospel at Central Christian School in Robertsdale, Alabama, where I taught. Pastor Lee Homoki moved in with us the week he came to Ohio as evangelist for our church revival. We were just a young couple, scared of life and timid before strangers. We certainly knew nothing about hospitality. But our arms had been twisted and we were committed. We gave him the spare bedroom and a meal here and there. Most of the time he was socializing with church people. I noticed that the man was himself the entire week, never putting on airs. I remember him comforting my husband, who had become overwhelmed by circumstances of life, and I appreciated Lee's intervention. It made us feel safe and loved. We were supposed to be caring for him, but he became the caregiver with his words.

During one of the services, Pastor Lee's words pierced

my heart, especially through an analogy he gave. His words are even now making an impact forty years later. My version may vary a little from the original, but it still gets the message across.

During that service, Pastor Lee described his take on petty church debates. He claimed that they remind him of the makings of a football game with both teams hoping to win. In his illustration, the ball had just been hiked. The quarterback avoided a tackle, throwing it long and hard to the receiver who was wide- open. The receiver, catching it squarely, could easily make a touchdown. He just needed to turn and run.

The people of the crowd held their breath, not moving their eyes from the young man on the field. Their excitement peaked, but they quickly became bewildered. The speed demon stood perfectly still. He appeared to be frozen. He stared hard at the football in his hands, puzzled. He began to question and count the number of stitches on the ball. The other players huddled around him and the debate began. Were there twelve stitches or thirteen?

All the while, the crowd was screaming, "Run!" But he was too enamored with the design of the ball to make any points for the team that day. Thank you, Evangelist Lee Homoki for the reminder to us that evening. All of heaven is watching with baited breath, shouting for us to run! Let us do the work of the ministry and high-tail it to the end-zone with the message of Jesus Christ for the masses.

I Found A Man With A Passion

Some of my fondest memories of my church growing up involved the annual camp meetings with hankies wavin' and fiery preachin', so meeting Cowboy S. Lee Homoki for the first time was a memorable occasion. I was captivated by this evangelist in cowboy garb, roping children and whipping paper out of people's hands...in a church building! That's just not something that happens every Sunday! While the whip and rope may have caught my attention, it was his passion that won me over. His sermon took me back to those camp meeting preachers. That Sunday I saw a preacher with conviction who spoke the word from the depths of his heart. Lee Homoki was not just playing cowboy; he had a passion for souls.

A few years later, I was asked (some would say "suckered") into being the morning Bible teacher for the first Missouri Cowboy Lee Cowboy Adventure Camp. I must say, it was a week I will never forget. Sleeping in a tent on 100 degree nights in jeans and long-sleeved shirts (Why? Cuz Lee wanted everything to be authentically cowboy), tornado-like winds that threw all of our tents into the woods one afternoon (I still remember the face of the one camper who was IN his tent during this time), cold showers in a horse stall surrounded by tarps (no girls allowed), the bucking barrel (LEE on the bucking barrel!)... man, what memories. At the heart of it all was Lee





Homoki (well, when he wasn't sitting in his air conditioned bus). Lee Homoki also had a passion to teach young people the ways of the cowboy and, more importantly, the ways of the Lord. There are men and women today who are serving the Lord due to the influence of Cowboy Homoki.

I spent time with Lee various times over the years in various capacities, but I really got to know him when I took a position with Bible Doctrines To Live By. Whether it was meeting for breakfast, board meetings, or helping him with a project, Lee was always kind and encouraging to me. Lee was more than a simple cowboy; he was very well-read and had contemplated many of the deep things of God's Word. I enjoyed many conversations with him over theological subjects and respected his zeal for preserving teaching through the written word.

Sadly, I also was around to see Evangelist Homoki's health and ability to communicate decline. I can tell you that it was hard for this man who had traveled many miles over many years, holding meetings and writing literature, to see it all come to a grinding halt. It was difficult for him to communicate, read, talk, or walk with his dog. Yet, he continued to try to contribute in any way that he could. I am so thankful that Lee is now enjoying the Savior he served faithfully for so many years.

Without Lee Homoki, there would be no Bible Doctrines To Live By. While the avenues for reaching others for Christ may have changed through the years, one thing remains: our purpose and desire is to see all saved and come to the knowledge of the truth. I can think of no better way to honor the legacy of Lee Homoki than to continue to exhibit the same passion that I saw in him those many years ago.



sermon series in books. Much to my surprise, these Bible study books "took off," beginning with THE MYSTERY which is still our most popular title.



"Lee Homoki had a big impact on both of us. When we were children, it was always a treat to have Cowboy Lee visit our school yearly and perform tricks with his ropes and whips. Hearing him preach afterwards was powerful. He was a great encouragement, not just to the kids in the school, but also to my (Carolyn's) father, who was the pastor and the principal of our school. It was clear he looked up to Lee over the years, right up to the very end – as did we.

A few years after Tadd and I were married, it was Lee and Darlene who gave us both jobs with Bible Doctrines. They welcomed us on board, even though we were unpolished and inexperienced. Through Lee, items such as Truth Aflame, Bible Briefs, books, booklets, tracts, conferences, planning meetings, Cowboy Lee summer camps, Family Bible camps, DVBS, mailings, came to be. His passion for preaching, teaching, and writing can be seen in the thousands pieces of Christian literature produced during his many years at the helm of BDTLB. Countless men and women and boys and girls came to know Jesus Christ as their personal Savior. Through all of this literature also, hundreds came to know the Gospel of the Grace of God – the difference between Law and Grace.

The staff all worked closely together. Well, we had good times, too...especially the word "Chinese." When we needed to "get away," Lee loved Chinese and, of course, we didn't let him go alone. We enjoyed our times together — birthdays, guests, planning luncheons (we did get things done), and so much more.

The planning for the conferences needed extra special attention. Lee was sure to let Darlene and I and whoever wanted to, go to Shipshewana and the Das Essenhaus restaurant. What a great day! He was known to go along with us, too.

Because of Lee's great leadership, he passed down many wonderful ideas, suggestions, etc., to the staff. The verse that describes this I believe can be found in I Corinthians 3:6; "So then neither he who plants is anything, nor he who waters, but God gives the increase." We are a team working together.

A Note from Darlene

"Precious Memories – how they linger..." I am so thankful for these precious memories. When Joel asked me to write a couple paragraphs about our ministry, I thought how can I put 60 years of memories into a nutshell unless it might be a coconut! Anyway, I'll give it a try.

We were married in September of 1960 following our graduation from the Arizona Bible Institute. My first memories of Lee were watching him preach on the street corner in Phoenix back when this was a requirement of the school that every Saturday night we were either on a street team or a Rescue Mission Team. His passion even then as a student was to preach the Word! He never lost that passion. He loved to share the Gospel and there was not a nurse, doctor, or therapist that came to the house that would leave without Lee giving them a tract or whenever possible talking to them about the Lord Jesus.

We moved several times from 1960 to 1981. Our first home was in Window Rock, AZ, the capital of the Navajo Indian Reservation where his parents were missionaries. A couple months after our wedding Lee decided we should do something for the Navajo teens. Lee contacted the Truth for Youth (Youth for Christ) Director in Phoenix and got permission to use their name and started Truth for Youth rallies every Saturday night in window Rock for the Navajo young people. We both worked full time because we didn't have any support for this ministry but the Lord provided us good jobs, and we were able to keep it going for a couple years adding a Friday night rally in Gallup, NM for the teens there.

Leaving Window Rock, we went as Youth Pastor to Phoenix Baptist Church, Phoenix, AZ, and also worked with Truth for Youth, then to Pomona Valley Baptist Church, Pomona, CA, as Youth Pastor, on to Pastor Twin Peaks Community Church, Twin Peaks, CA, and after five years to Pastor the Gospel Lighthouse Church in Tipp City, Ohio, and in 1977 to Berean Bible Church in Evansville, IN.

Finally, in 1981 we found ourselves in Grand Rapids, MI, where Lee founded and directed the ministry of Bible Doctrines to Live By, until 2008, when Joel McGarvey became the Executive Director of Bible Doctrines, freeing Lee of the administrative work.

Bible Doctrines was formed with the intent of an itinerant ministry of Evangelism, Bible Conferences, etc., and a printing ministry developing and printing Bible study materials with an emphasis on "right division" of the Word. Lee started out with a couple of meetings scheduled for 1981, and I got a job at Home Insurance Co. We were so thankful for my job and for requests for additional meetings coming in thanks to Pastor Henry Kulp of Altoona, PA, who had told Lee, if he would start out, Pastor Kulp would help him get started with some contacts and a

recommendation. It wasn't long before

Lee's schedule was as full as he wanted. For 15 years he traveled all summer by himself, while I stayed home with Steve and Cari and worked at the Insurance Company. (I started as a clerk typist but by the time the company closed, in 1995 I was Supervisor of the entire clerical unit. Many changes there too.) When the company closed, we decided I was going to join Lee in his travels and we would trust the Lord for increased support of Bible Doctrines to supplement our income. We never went without!! Thank and Praise to the Lord.

We traveled extensively across the USA doing Evangelistic and Bible Conferences and soon added helping the small churches do their

Lee Adventure Cowboy Camps. These were a highlight of Lee's ministry. How he loved and enjoyed working with, and mentoring young people. We would take a Gospel Team with us during the

summer months and he would always give the young people an opportunity to share their testimonies and, if the men so desired, he would help them prepare and give their first sermons. It has been a joy to watch these young people mature and now find many of them in full-time ministries themselves.

We also traveled to other countries. I joined him to go to England and Scotland, to Australia, New Zeeland and Hawaii. Our final foreign trip was to Africa in 2001 (Zambia and Zimbabwe). What great and exciting experiences we had in our ministry. Lee had also gone to Curacao and the Philippines before I went with him overseas

I could share many stories of the Lord's blessings and some heartaches with you, but that would take an extra, extra large coconut to do that; so suffice it to

The first time I met "Cowboy Lee" was many years ago, while serving as Youth Pastor at Northwest Bible Church in Enumclaw, Washington. He preached that Sunday morning and shared some of his rope tricks. Most importantly he shared the gospel and how the Lord had impacted his life. He didn't candy-coat the differences of opinion or

He was ready to go Home as he said but NOT THE NURSING HOME! Praise the Lord he is

the unique philosophies that existed within our fellowship, and yet he saw the diversity as an opportunity to model the beauty of the "Body of Christ" and how effective we can be when we work together.

One visit with Lee and Darlene that I will remember most is when Dr. Sam Vinton Jr. joined me for a visit to the Homoki home. I really didn't say much during that time together. I simply listened. To hear these two men, of great faith, share about their trip to Zambia was so special. I have looked up to both of these men for many years, so being able to sit back and hear firsthand how God used the two of them to minister to the young leaders in Africa was special. It simply affirmed for me that God is powerful and is able to use any one of us to change the lives of others, even thousands of miles away from home. Highlighting God's faithfulness above all, I am secondarily drawn to the willingness of brother Lee to be used by God, no matter the time or location. Lee was and still is a testimony of "bravery" and "courage" as one that simply responds to the leading of the Lord to advance the gospel for the glory of God! Brother Lee will be missed, but the Lord's legacy through him will carry on for eternity. There is no doubt that many will spend eternity in the presence of Jesus, simply because of God's faithfulness and Lee's willingness. Love you Lee!

As he developed Cowboy Lee's Cowboy Adventure Camps, he included programs for girls and families. The facilities improved but the focus remained to proclaim the grace found in Christ Jesus, teach others to be faithful to proclaim God's matchless grace found in His word.

Many cowboys and cowgirls testify that Cowboy Lee impacted their lives through the camp program. The skills they learned are used today as they share God's amazing gospel of grace and many believed in the finished work of Christ Jesus.

As a staff member I testify to a much closer relationship with Christ Jesus through the Bible studies and excellent sermons presented by Cowboy Lee. He presented the truth of God's Word in a manner that brought me right where I needed to be to grow. Sometimes that included enduring hardness. His example was to be gracious when rebuffed by those who were not receptive to the truth of God's grace.




Remembering Lee Homoki

Lee Homoki Left His Mark

As I reflect on the life and ministry of Lee Homoki, my mind immediately drifts back to the first time I heard Lee preach. I was a freshman at Grace Bible College (Grace Christian University), and each day we would attend chapel and listen to various speakers share messages from God's Word. I must have attended what seemed like hundreds of chapel messages in my five years at Grace, and, to this day, I can only remember a few. Lee Homoki was one of the few that left an imprint on that young college freshman studying for the ministry. When Lee took the pulpit, he immediately had the attention of everyone in the room. He not only spoke with a loud booming voice, but he spoke with passion and conviction. You could tell that Lee believed in what he preached and wanted everyone who heard him to know his Lord. Now upon graduation and beginning my ministry, I would see Lee from time to time. Each time I was confronted with a man who loved the Lord and maintained a passion for souls until the day he died.

Lee was also a man who wanted to get the message of grace out to as many people as possible. He wrote just like he preached, with purpose. In every area of ministry, Lee's purpose was that men and women could know Christ as Savior and be grounded in the truth of the Word.

Lee founded the ministry Bible Doctrines to Live By and that name says so much about Lee's heart and passion. 


We Got More than We Bargained For
